

EXTENT OF LISTING:

To the extent of: 1. All the buildings and all of the reserve.

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PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION:

The surviving buildings associated with the State School have only one section of the original building remaining. This section is at the core of the current building.

The new building was constructed in 1963 and is a raised asymmetrical timber structure with banks of windows on both sides and a porch which separates the newest structure from the older incorporated section. The school is set in a traditional playground with asphalt courts, equipment and plantings.

A National School Reserve was gazetted in Cavendish in 1852 (Education Department Victoria), on the corner of Barker and Chirnside Street, two blocks south of the centre of the township of Cavendish. The allotments allocated were allotments17, 18 & 19 of Section 8, comprising an area 500 x 300 feet, or about .5 hectare (Public Lands Office, 1858).

According the Shire of Dundas Centenary, this was the first School to open in the former Shire of Dundas, and it was called the Cavendish Boarding School, operated by a Mr. James Brake (Shire of Dundas, 105). This school was referred to by James Bonwick as "an excellent national school, which boasts of being the largest boarding school in the west" (ibid., 64) where many settlers sent their children many miles to attend. The Cavendish School was later known as the Wannon National School prior to the Education Department taking control of the school in the 1873 (ibid., 105).

A new school building and Memorial Gates (dedicated to all past scholars who served in the Second World War) were constructed in 1952, and the school buildings which had previously served were demolished in 1963 (Department of Education).

By 1967, the land gazetted for the Board of Education comprised of the south section of all of Section 8.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

The Cavendish State School No. 116 is located on the State School Reserve, on the southern half of Section 8, bound by Barker, Chirnside and Cameron Streets, 2 blocks south of the centre of the township. The use of the site as a school dates from 1852, when James Brake started a boarding school, sometimes referred to as the Wannon School. Later school buildings were constructed towards the end of the nineteenth century, but were mostly demolished when the current building was constructed in 1963. A small portion of one of the late nineteenth century buildings survives as the core of the 1963 structure. The buildings and school complex are in very good condition, and retain a high degree of integrity from the 1963 construction period. The earliest sections which are within the modern school retain limited integrity.
